'Negatives,' First Film by Medak, Bows

66% JEGATIVES," the British drama new that opened at the Festival Theather yesterday, is so good in so many of its particulars that it is hard to believe that it finally goes so wrong with such a straight face.

The movie, which starts off as a sort of highly cinematic "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" winds up as an episode right out of "Peanuts," with Snoopy, imagining himself as the gallant Red Baron, crashing to his death on top of his dog house of his dog house.

Theo (Peter McEnery), who runs a tacky antique shop in London, and Vivien (Glenda Jackson), his beautiful, irritable mistress, have no personalities of their own. To resonalities of their own. 10 re-lieve their boredom, and to excite themselves sexually, they spend Sunday after-noons playing an elaborate, noons playing an elaborate, sado-masochistic charade. He dresses up like Dr. Crippen (the meek Edwardian Bluebeard) and she is alternately his wife, mistress and boy traveling companion.

"You bore me and I bore you," Vievien tells Theo in a moment of what the sex manuals call "afterglow."
"Sometimes I can hear you running after me, puff, puff, puff. When you make love, you're ridiculous. You breathe so hard I think you're going to choke."

This uneasy alliance broken by the arrival of Reingard (Diane Cilento), a bisexual German girl, a sometime photographer, who suggests to Theo that he bears a remarkable resemblance Baron von Richtofen, the German World War I air ace.

The suggestion is taken literally and Theo begins his own one-man charade. He huys an old Tiger Moth, sets it up on his terrace and en-ters a world of Snoopy-like ters a world of Snoopy-like daydreams, culminating with a final mission that leaves him sitting—crumpled—in the Tiger Moth's cockpit, his eyes open and blood curling down from the corner of his mouth -- the Richtofen stigmata.

It actually is quite a good movie until it is taken over by the fantasies—and by the anxious hand of a young (31 years old) director who wants to make a meaningful
